University Information	
General Information	Founded in 1832, the University is the third oldest in England. Durham is a collegiate institution, with 17 Colleges which provide a social, domestic and pastoral focus for students, as well as University accommodation, if eligible. Ustinov College performs this role exclusively for postgraduate students. The University has long since grown beyond the historic centre of Durham to include a modern science site, student accommodation, libraries, and sports and social facilities. The University buildings are spread across the City on several sites within easy walking distance of each other. Teaching and Research are organised by the Academic Departments which are quite separate from the Colleges.
	The University has a total student population of about 16,000, nearly a quarter of those on postgraduate courses. The work of the University covers traditional areas of study/education, including key branches of



science and technology. Durham graduates are in great demand among employers and the University helps to attract investment into the region. It provides training, short courses and expertise for industry, and through its cultural events, conferences and tourist business and as a major employer, the University contributes in a wide social and economic sense to the local community.
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City and Regional Information	
Where is Durham?	Durham University is a busy research and teaching community located in the historic cathedral city of Durham in the North-East of England, an area famed for its attractive countryside, coastline and cultural heritage. As well as its magnificent Cathedral and Castle, both World Heritage Sites, the city has other buildings of distinction and fine river banks which can be seen on foot in a few hours. Durham is three hours by train from London and Manchester, two hours from Edinburgh, and less than one hour from two regional airports, Newcastle International and Durham Tees Valley.

	Students may be able to take modules in other departments, but please be aware that certain restrictions and prerequisites may apply and that you might not be able to take courses in all departments.	
	Students who are registered as UG (Bachelor) level students at the time of their exchange should request to study UG level modules only. If there is a specific need to take Master level modules, please discuss this prior to submitting an application.	
	Students who are registered as PG (Master) level students at the time of their exchange should request to study PG (Master) modules only wherever possible. We may be able to approve some modules at UG (Bachelor) level but we cannot guarantee this. If you are registered for both UG and PG modules, you should be aware that confirmation of marks for PG modules does not happen until October of each year.	
	Short Term Erasmus students:	
	For students coming to Durham for less than the full academic year, we are unable to provide full credit recognition. Students will receive an official transcript listing the modules taken and an appendix with confirmed grades by department.	
Credits and Course Load	The normal workload for a full-time student is 120 Durham credits per academic year. This normally equates to 6 modules per academic year at 20 credits each.	
	Durham University has not adopted ECTS as the credits system, however, Durham credits can be translated into ECTS as follows: Durham credits x 0.5 = ECTS. E.g. 20 Durham credits x 0.5 = 10 ECTS. While the Module handbooks will list ECTS credits, all other University publications will list Durham credits.	
Language of Instruction	English	
Important Information	Examinations : The academic year at Durham University follows a term system with 3 terms per year. Examinations are mostly held at the end of each academic year only. Special/ alternative assessment arrangements for Erasmus students coming for less than a year can usually be made with the individual departments.	
	Durham University does presently not allocate ECTS credits to the individual academic terms as individual modules are designed to run over the full academic year (see Examinations). It is important for partner universities to define an appropriate credit load for their students for the duration they will spend in Durham. Partners will be provided with all the details relating to the academic work completed by a student for the duration of their studies at Durham University in the Academic Transcript towards the end of each term and the official Transcript of Records will be sent to the partner universities in the Summer.

Short Term Duration students	 Durham currently operates a full academic year structure which means there is only one assessment period in June of each year. For those students coming to Durham for less than the full year as agreed in advance, each module convener is required to set alternative assessment for the student. This arrangement means we are not able to provide students with a full official transcript. The official transcript contains a list of the modules the student has taken but with no grades. The International Office will produce a transcript appendix document with grades provided by each department and confirmed by a Board of Examiners. An example of this document can be requested from the International Office.

	Overseas Exchange students only: All full year overseas exchange students are guaranteed a place in one of the residential colleges of the University if they apply for the programme by the deadline. Students opt for college accommodation on the application form. Students will be notified of their college via e-mail. The college will then contact the student with further details prior to arrival. Student coming for less than the full academic year are not eligible for accommodation and will need to source their own accommodation. Erasmus students:

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	students to come for a full academic year (October - June) and follow normal assessment structures as set for modules and earn full credit points.
	Part year Erasmus study periods are possible only with the consent of the receiving department and provided that placements start in October (Michaelmas term) . Starting an Erasmus study period in January (term 2) is only possible with special consent and should normally be confined to students undertaking project or research work in one of the departments. <i>Please consult the Module handbook for the relevant department for</i> <i>part-year study opportunities. Some restrict admission to students</i> <i>coming for the full academic year only.</i>
	Please note that it is <u>not</u> possible to start in the Easter term (April - June), except by special arrangement for project /research work.
